The Club hosted our annual meeting on Tuesday, January 17, 2016. We had a great turnout and easily met a quorum. Thank you to all those who attended and submitted your proxies, as well as to the Kingspoint Women's Club for graciously providing refreshments.

In addition, Amy Gaunt remains Board Secretary (elected to 2-year term in 2016). Oli Kerscher will continue to provide the Board with support related to membership (a non-Board position). No longer co-presidents, we will now be working with the Board on welcoming new Kingspoint families to the

Club (Molly) and coordinating social activities (Meredith).

We could not be more confident in this 2017 Board. Greg has completely impressed us with his level of dedication and attention to detail during his time as Facilities Chair. With his leadership, our team of facilities volunteers has grown significantly, as evidenced by our most recent Fall Cleanup Day at the Club. He is joined by Sean Sparkman, a resident of Kingspoint for the past 10 years, and owner and operator of Noah's Ark Veterinary Practice in Norge. Greg and Sean are both raising young families in the neighborhood and are fully committed to the success of the Club. It helps that they are both also genuinely nice and trustworthy people. In addition, Dave Stanhope will fill Greg's vacancy in Facilities. Dave was instrumental in rebuilding the playground structure at the recent work day and honed his handyman chops building treehouses during time with the Peace Corps in the Philippines. We can't imagine a more capable team.

With the Kingspoint Green project now complete, the Board will turn its focus in 2017 to proactive asset maintenance (pool pump room infrastructure); refinancing the Clubhouse loan, which matures this year; and initiating shoreline resiliency planning efforts. The Board will also continue to look for ways to increase membership among residents and non-residents, encourage volunteering, and improve our outreach to new neighbors.

Serving as co-presidents has been a fun and enlightening experience. We've loved working together and with our talented Board members. More than anything, we love that it brought us closer to so many of our neighbors and gave us a true appreciation for the legacy of service in Kingspoint. This place is awesome in so many ways (not the least of which is natural beauty), but it's truly wonderful because of the people who call it home.

However you choose to do it—through a Board position or cleaning up after a picnic—

volunteering with the Club will enrich your life in Kingspoint. Volunteer labor is also essential to the success of the Club, which has significant impacts on all of our property values. Ask a new family what attracted them to the neighborhood, we guarantee the Kingspoint Club was a chief consideration. If you're a resident and not a member, we hope you will consider joining and contributing to the benefits we all enjoy as Kingspoint homeowners.

Highlights from the KP Club Annual Meeting

- We reported the following major accomplishments in 2016:
 - Completing the Kingspoint Green project (depaving and greening the old tennis courts)
 - o Streamlining the annual dues structure
 - o Replacing pool furniture
- Tracy Peters gave a recap of the 2016 budget and an outlook for 2017. We enter 2017 on strong financial footing with increased revenue and a healthy reserve fund. Working with BB&T Bank, we will refinance the current Clubhouse loan this year. Membership approved the 2017 budget.
- Oli Kerscher noted the Club has 148 members in good standing and 152 total stockholders. We welcomed six new resident households in 2016.
- Jamie Peters reported that we increased non-resident Clubhouse rental rates in 2016 to \$300 for half day and \$500 for full day. Security deposits and cleaning fees also increased. The rates for members did not increase.

- The Club's major expenditure this year will be improvements to pool pump room infrastructure, as outlined by Greg Henderson. The Club is working with pool contractors to develop a financing plan to complete all necessary repairs at once.
- Danny Schmidt reported that we successfully completed the Kingspoint Green project. We will lay more seed in the spring and the Green will be open for business this summer season. Danny raised \$10,000 in voluntary donations from Kingspoint Club members; the Club provided an additional \$5,000 that was approved by the membership at the 2016 annual meeting. WE CANNOT THANK DANNY ENOUGH FOR ALL HIS HARD WORK he is the reason this project was completed on schedule and budget!!!!
- Meredith Robertson stated that she will be helping coordinate social activities.
 We need volunteers to make events happen and ideas for new activities are welcome and encouraged. Contact her at mmrobertson77@gmail.com. One new event planned for 2017 is an oar and paddle regatta for small craft, followed by a picnic on the Green.
- Molly Taylor stated that she is looking for individuals to serve as Club "ambassadors" to welcome new families and educate them on the benefits of membership. If you are interested in helping with this initiative, please contact her at mollythiel@hotmail.com.

Hello, I'm Diane Hartley, the Director of the Peninsula Agency on Aging's Williamsburg Resources Center. Since 1974, Peninsula Agency on Aging (PAA) has provided services to seniors and people with disabilities to enable them to remain in their homes with independence. PAA is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that provides transportation, access to in-home care and Meals on Wheels, and connects seniors and their caregivers to the many resources available in our community. We conduct in-home assessments to help seniors identify the types of assistance they could use and then connect them to resources that help make their lives easier and safer. We offer chair yoga classes, lunch and learn caregiver education series, and programs to address social isolation. All of our services are free or on a sliding scale. We appreciate all of the contributions and membership support we have received from neighbors during our 2016 membership drive. We can accomplish good things for our community when we work together. Every family's membership is important, and your contributions fund the ongoing work of your Neighborhood Association.

Peggy Manning is finishing up revisions to our **2017 Kingspoint Neighborhood Directory**, which we plan to distribute to every home by mid-February. If you want to confirm the information Peggy has for your family, or if any neighbor wants to update your information, please contact Peggy Manning (784-0142) by January 28.

We publish the Directory in hard copy, and distribute only to neighborhood residents, to protect neighbors' privacy. Last year we published Kingspoint maps and provided a

plastic cover for the first time in many years. Please keep those maps and re-use the cover with your new 2017 Directory when it arrives.

Phase 1 of our entrance renovation project is underway as we begin to remove the overgrown Leyland Cypress trees and diseased Juniper shrubs at our neighborhood entrance. The Cypress, planted as shrubs some years ago, are shallow rooted and can easily come down in a storm. We will continue removing them, a few at a time, to allow more light and air to reach the remaining shrubs and trees.

We have an arborist contracted to prune and clean up the area in advance of re-planting, which will begin later this year. *Thank you for your patience, contributions and support during this project.*

Williamsburg won the snow lottery earlier this month and weathered more accumulation than we've seen for many years. We appreciate everyone who helped with clean up. We extend a special thank-you to those neighbors who volunteered their help to clear walks and driveways for others who needed assistance.

VDOT did a great job of plowing and sanding our entrance and some neighborhood streets. We appreciate their swift response in the face of this unusual storm. We had VDOT, and our contractor, working in Kingspoint on several different occasions Sunday morning and Monday between afternoon. While this is the safest our streets have ever been after a major snow storm, we realize there is still room for improvement and are working to sort that out.

We appreciate everyone's cooperation in keeping parked cars off of our major streets after the storm to allow the plows room to work. We had some problems with VDOT plows having to work around cars on side streets, which slowed them down considerably. In future, we ask all residents to keep their vehicles parked in their driveway during

and after a snow storm so the streets can be cleared and treated more efficiently.

Our Kingspoint Neighborhood was especially beautiful this December. Thank you to everyone who participated and helped with "Light the Night, Kingspoint!" It was a team effort and a lot of fun for all who came. We extend special thanks to Rebecca Elton, who led us in song.

Our neighborhood kept getting brighter and brighter with lights, window candles, wreathes and festive decorations as the month progressed. The Great Backyard Bird Count

You might be interested in <u>The Great Backyard Bird Count coming February 16-20</u>, 2017. This international project was launched in 1998 by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and The National Audubon Society. The GBBC is an online citizen-science project to collect data on wild birds.

Register to participate, and then count birds for as little as 15 minutes during the five day project. Observe as often, and in as many places as you like. Submit your observations online, and view the results from participants across 130 countries in real time.

There is an online bird identification guide to assist you, and participants are encouraged to share photos of the birds they observe. Kingspoint is a great place to observe many different bird species, especially during seasonal migrations.

FYI: Resource Protection Areas

College Creek embraces our neighborhood to the west, and Halfway Creek to the south. We have two large lakes within the community. Rainwater which falls on Kingspoint eventually flows into the Chesapeake Bay. Like all of James City County, **Kingpsoint is a Chesapeake Bay Preservation Area**, and we can all practice good stewardship of our rich and diverse natural resources.

Land adjacent to wetlands is particularly sensitive. Proper management allows the land to act as a filter to trap pollutants, including silt, before they reach the creeks and the bay. We enjoy the many beautiful birds and other animals these naturalized areas support.

The 1988 Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act, which has resulted in laws for how sensitive lands adjacent to wetlands can be developed, came twenty years after our Kingspoint neighborhood was built. A current map of Resource Protection Areas (RPAs) indicates that many of our homes and yards fall within these protected areas. It would be far more challenging to develop Kingspoint today, due to these environmental protections.

Resource Protection Areas extend 100' landward from the shore of a wetland, including the Kingspoint lakes. But many of our ravines also qualify as RPAs because of the streams which flow through them, to the lakes and creeks. Although we own our lots, we all need to educate ourselves about what parts of our properties may fall in a protected RPA.

There are many laws which control the management of RPAs, and we need to work with the James City County Office of Engineering and Resource Protection before building, landscaping, cutting trees or clearing undergrowth within an RPA. Violations can result in substantial fines and other costs.

Our forested and natural areas are very important. They filter many pollutants from the air and from stormwater run-off. They limit erosion, and provide habitat to the rich web of life around us.

We all enjoy the natural beauty of our community, and working together, we can manage it responsibly to help preserve our unique Tidewater ecosystem. *Please be a good steward of this land, which we hold in trust for future generations.* You may call county staff at 757-253-6670 with any questions.

FYI: Wildlife Sightings in Kingspoint

Neighbors continue to see, and hear wild animals in Kingspoint, including not only birds, squirrels and deer; but also gray foxes, coyotes, raccoon, and opossum. **Some neighbors report hearing coyotes howling at night.** Please be aware that any food left out of doors will attract wildlife, especially during winter months when natural food sources may be scarce.

Wild animals venture into neighborhoods as their habitat is developed, to escape predators and to look for food. While many of us enjoy watching the many animals who live near our homes, some of these animals can present a danger to our children and pets. As their numbers increase it becomes more likely that unpleasant incidents may arise.

Neighbors have legitimate concerns about residents who intentionally feed wild mammals. Many are concerned for their own health, and for the well-being of their pets and children. Rabies and other diseases may be transmitted to pets and people by sick wildlife. Many of these animals also bring ticks and other insects into our yards and leave behind their scat.

Our wild animals are a common resource, and don't 'belong' to any city, county, agency or individual. It is unlawful to trap and move, or to in any way harm, a nuisance animal in our

own yard. Our state and county governments don't have resources to trap and re-locate these animals.

When problems arise with a nuisance animal, it is up to the individual homeowner to hire a licensed private trapper to remove the problem animal.

Clubhouse Entrance Patio Bricks

The past few years we have welcomed many new families to the Kingspoint community. These families may not have thought about or known how to order a brick for the Clubhouse entrance. When we built the Clubhouse we conducted a "Fundraiser" that generated money to furnish the clubhouse. At that time we offered bricks with personal messages, and benches, trees, etc. and raised over \$20,000! This time we are ordering only bricks.

Personal messages have honored families, children, grandchildren, neighbors, former residents, individuals, who have passed on, and pets. For many of us it has served as a way to remember all the wonderful neighbors who make Kingspoint what it is. This is also a way to show your pride in your swimmers!

Ordering a brick is very simple and easy. We charge \$100.00 for a "STANDARD" brick (4"x8") which allows 15 characters per line (including spaces) and 4 lines of text. (Call me if you want a larger brick, 8"x 8".)

- 1. Check out bricks in the patio to get an idea for your brick.
- 2. Give me a call and I will help you with the wording. (The website where I order has a "brick creator" where I can make a digital brick and email it to you.) This is a very simple process that allows you to see what you are getting.
- 3. Send a check made out to me, Robert Hanny, for \$100.00. I will order your brick, pay for it and when your brick arrives I will cash your check and send the balance, usually \$60.00 to the club, (less my expense which includes the brick and shipping). A standard brick usually costs \$40.00 depending on how many bricks are in an order.

- 4. Bricks are usually shipped and received in 3-4 weeks. Weather permitting, I then install the brick.




