KINGSPOINT BUS STOP PROBLEMS

Hello neighbors,

I am writing to update you regarding the ongoing Matthew Whaley Elementary school bus stop issues. In particular we are having a difficult time with the Southpoint/Archer's Hope/Pinepoint four way intersection bus stop. Since sending an email to the community on Thursday, we have had **FIVE** more morning infractions (in two days) where multiple drivers pass the school bus illegally **while** the stop sign is out, lights are flashing and children are boarding the bus.

This morning one driver even ignored the Head of Transportation for WJCC Schools as she held up her hand in an attempt to stop him from sneaking around the stopped bus. He honked at her twice, then speed around her and drove off. She was there to observe the ongoing problems at our stop and certainly got an idea of what we

have been struggling with.

At this point, the next logical consequence is going to be a significant ticket for illegally passing a stopped school bus. This ticket will not only be expensive but it can earn you 6 points, which is the same number of points on your drivers license as a DWI. A Police officer will be present at our bus stop sporadically and will be writing tickets to any drivers disobeying the law.

We understand that it is difficult for drivers going through the intersection to see everything going on with so many children and so much activity. The parents at the bus stop are trying hard to remind the children of basic rules of safety and respect to fellow residents and are making strides to better control the large group. We currently have 15+ children between the ages of 2 and 10 years old at our bus stop. We are working to keep the children in a central location so they are not running across the street and will encourage parents to park on side roads to make it safer for drivers going through the intersection.

We are working with the school system to alter the bus stop location and make various changes to protect the children. As we work through this process we would appreciate your ongoing support. As a reminder, the bus arrives daily at our stop around 8:50am and returns the children home regularly a little after 4:30pm.

In closing, we adore this neighborhood and know how lucky we are to be a part of such a wonderful community. I am grateful to the vast majority of our neighbors who are taking this seriously, following the laws and working with us to keep the children safe.

Thanks to the parents for keeping the neighborhood apprised of this situation. I've

encountered the scene on week day mornings with many kids and a few parents waiting for the bus. Some kids use the street and surrounding yards as a playground. Sometimes parents' cars are parked along the shoulder. And then the bus comes and has to turn around. I understand as a motorist how difficult it is to get thru that intersection. I think more parents need to be out there with their kids to make sure they're under control.

That said, any car that disregards the stop sign on the bus is obviously breaking the law, and I would help the bus driver collect all information needed to report them to the police. How about a video of the car and license plate? Let's seek guidance from WJCC Transportation and the JCC police on how to minimize the risk of a tragic accident.

Kingspoint: Preserving Our Clean Water Heritage

Many thanks to everyone

who attended our **Preserving our Clean Water Heritage** gathering on October 2, sponsored by the Kingspoint neighborhood Association and the Kingspoint Club. We especially appreciate co-organizer Ann Hobson and KPNA Board members Emily McDowell and Melody Nichols who organized hospitality

for the evening, and Kenita Hill who assisted

Those who attended found a wealth of resources provided by our county Stormwater and Environmental Protection staff, The James River Association and The John Clayton Chapter of the Virginia Native Plant Society.

Each of us can make a positive difference for water quality in our two Kingspoint lakes, and in College Creek and Halfway Creek, through the ways we manage our own properties. Preventing erosion is a key goal, along with reducing lawn and landscape chemicals, preventing pet waste from entering the watershed, and planting landscaping which helps to absorb and filter rainwater run-off.

Speakers demonstrated how rain gardens may be constructed in our yards to collect stormwater run-off so that it can soak into the water table instead of creating erosion and carrying pollutants into the lakes and creeks. Rain gardens are not ponds, and generally allow the water they collect to absorb back into the soil within a day or so.

Neighbors interested in rain gardens may contact our local Master Gardeners for assistance in planning their rain garden. After applying for the Turf Love program, JCC residents will be guided in the planning and construction of a rain garden, if one is appropriate for their property. Those who complete this program may apply for a grant of \$5.00 per square foot, to reimburse some of the expense.

County Stormwater Specialists will also visit your home, upon request, to evaluate erosion issues on your property and assist in finding a solution. They will also advise you if you want to improve areas of your property which fall within our Resource Protection Areas. These areas extend 100' from any fresh water or active creek, and are protected by law. A map of our Kingsoint Resource Protection Areas is now available at the Clubhouse.

Learn about services available in our community for elders. Over 40 vendors will be participating and providing information on nutrition, home health care, leisure and recreational services and more. Also available at this event are FREE preventive health screenings including vision, hearing, cholesterol and blood pressure; as well as the opportunity to get your vaccinations

Neighborhood Watch

You may turn in expired, unneeded or unused prescription drugs on October 28, between 10:00 AM and 2:00 PM, during the **Prescription Drug Take-Back day** at the Law Enforcement Center on Opportunity Way. Our JCC Police sponsor this annual event in cooperation with the DEA, which takes the drugs and disposes of them appropriately with no questions asked. **Only solid prescription drugs can be accepted.** *No sharps or liquids, please.*

Turning in unneeded prescription drugs helps keep them out of our waterways and landfills. It also prevents theft or misuse of these sometimes dangerous prescription drugs.

Vehicle thefts, and thefts from vehicles, remain a significant problem in our region. There have also been a number of burglaries from unlocked homes, in some cases with the resident at home, in James City County during September. Police officers ask that we remain mindful of locking our homes and vehicles, and keep our valuables out of sight, so that these 'crimes of opportunity' may be prevented.

MPO Alan McDowell described recent burglaries at the Neighborhood Forum on September 13, reporting that groups of individuals are canvassing JCC neighborhoods, checking door handles on cars and doorknobs on homes. When there is an unlocked vehicle, it is searched for electronics, cash and other valuables. Unlocked homes may be entered through an unlocked door, window, or garage.

These groups are always accompanied by a driver, slowly cruising the community, to allow those on foot a quick get-away. As many as five neighborhoods have been hit in a single night, usually between 11:00 PM and 7:00 AM.

A JCC officer will come to your home or business to give you a **security audit or lighting audit,** suggesting ways to make your space more secure. Outdoor lighting, especially motion activated lights, are very helpful in keeping miscreants away. This is one of the many services our police department offers to residents at no charge. Contact Sergeant John LeClaire at 757-259-5174 to make an appointment.

Coloring with A Cop at Barnes and Nobles bookstore allows little ones to meet and interact informally with uniformed police officers while they color and read together. Enjoy this free monthly event on November 6 at 11:00 AM.


