**FYI.** Our local police, working in cooperation with the DEA, will sponsor a **Drug Take Back Initiative** on Saturday, **October 26 from 10 AM to 2 PM** at the Law Enforcement Center on Opportunity Way, just off of Rt. 60 near Harris Teeter. Residents may anonymously turn in expired or unused solid dosage prescription drugs.

#### **NOTES FROM NEIGHBORS**

Numerous Kingspoint neighbors continue to report problems with deer on neighborhood streets and in their yards this month. Herds of a dozen or more deer are seen on some Kingspoint streets.

Deer eat both native vegetation and landscaping, bring ticks and diseases into our yards and interfere with neighbors' normal use of their property. Deer also present a safety hazard to drivers, bikers, and neighbors out walking their dogs.

Please remember to never put out food for deer or other mammalian wildlife, which attracts a variety of animals to our community. It is a violation of state law to feed deer between September 1 and early January, as it is considered 'baiting.'

If anyone sees or suspects someone of illegally feeding deer during this time period, please report it to DGIF's Wildlife Crime Line at 1-800-237-5712.







# Plant of the Month: Camellia sasanqua

What a delight to see bright flowers open on our evergreen *Camellia* shrubs during autumn, just as the rest of the

garden fades and we prepare for winter. You may have noticed neighbors' *Camellias* blooming in October through January and wondered about these beautiful rose-like flowers in shades of red, pink and white.

A relative of the tea plant, autumn blooming Asian *Camellias* are hardy in Zones 6b-9. Like the spring blooming *Camellia japonica*, they prefer moist, acidic soil. Fall blooming *Camellias* will tolerate full to partial sun, under the dappled shade of larger trees. They may be used as specimen plants, hedges, in mixed borders, or as large foundation shrubs. Different cultivars will grow to different proportions, and many will grow into small trees, if left unpruned.

Camellias keep their glossy green leaves yearround, adding structure and screening in the garden throughout the year. Pollinators appreciate this source of nectar when little else is in bloom, and birds find shelter in their branches.

Many varieties are available now at local nurseries. You can choose from several different colors and flower forms, finding a cultivar that will meet your needs for mature shape and size. Varieties like *C. 'Yuletide'* are especially prized for their red flowers each December.

Newly planted shrubs will need protection from deer for the first few years. Deer may graze both leaves and flower buds, but the shrub will generally survive. Use deer fencing, Milorganite, or repellant sprays to protect *Camellias* as they establish. Some fungal diseases can infect *Camellias*, but good air circulation and care will prevent disease problems. Insect damage is rare.

Plant Camellia sasanqua shrubs with confidence that they will survive and thrive in our neighborhood, rewarding you with decades of beautiful late autumn flowers.

### **FYI LEAF DISPOSAL**

James City County residents may drop off leaves in clear leaf sized bags free of charge Nov. 11-24, 2019 and Jan. 6-19, 2020 at the Jolly Pond Convenience Center, 1204 Jolly Pond Road. The Convenience Center is open daily from 7 a.m.-5 p.m. Resident may also pick up bagged leaves, at no charge, to use for personal composting. At the Jolly Pond Convenience Center.

There will be one round of curbside leaf collection, scheduled for December 2-6 in our voting district. Leaves must be in clear plastic bags (40 gallons or less). Bagged leaves should be left curbside by 8 a.m. on the first day of collection in each district. Each street will be collected one time only. Bulky materials such as brush and tree limbs cannot be accepted.

Leaves may also be shredded and left in place or used as mulch. This helps improve our clay soil, protects shrubs and perennials from frost heave, and helps prevent erosion. Burning isn't permitted in residential areas of James City County.


